But it has certainly given Doncaster-emplestowe City Council an unusual Templestowe problem.

It all started when our footballers were putting too much effort behind their drop punts for goal at the Kooyong (tennis courts) end of the Recreation Reserve.

No matter how accurate our forwards were, their kicks landed slap bang in the middle of the tennis courts. This obviously disturbed

This obviously disturbed many an attempted lob or backhand — so the council has been appointed referee.

The tennis club wrote to council complaining of constant bombardment from footballs and requested an extension of the existing fence or the installation catching net.

John Scott pointed out, these don't come cheaply — about \$3050 for the fence to be extended and \$5000 for a catching net.

IRE CHI FRUL

Warrandyte firefighters are preparing for what threatens to be one of their worst-ever summers.

They appeal to residents to obey the rules and keep Warrandyte out of the headlines in what has been offically predicted as a season of exceptionally high bushfire danger.

A brigade veteran told the Diary: "There are three major causes of fires men, women and children."

"Each year the fire services issue warnings.

"Each year they ignored because there has not been a fire in the area for some time.

"But in this area, two things are certain.

"Every drought year is extremely dangerous, and the longer it has been since there has been a serious fire, the closer it is to the next one."

The local brigades say:

Each resident has a re-sponsibility to himself, his family, his neighbours and the community to ensure that he does not cause a fire carelessness, apathy or ignorance.

And he should ensure that he does not contribute to the spread of a fire because he has not taken sensible precautions to protect his own property.

He must know and observe the restrictions on the lighting and use of fire, not only on total fire ban days, only on total fire ban days, but throughout the declared fire danger period.

If he does not know the rules, he should get a copy of the booklet "Summer Peril" from his local brigade.

Prohibition notices warning of fire bans and restric-tions will go up in this area on December 16.

The brigades urge residents to clean up their properties NOW.

Their advice:

- · Get rid of all rubbish, dead grass and leaves, paper and the like from around the property.
- Make sure your garden hoses are in good condi-tion — that you have enough of them to reach all parts of the buildings and that all hoses fit all taps.
 - · Keep all spoutings,

- roof valleys and down pipes clear of dead leaves. down-
- Cover all ventilators and open eaves with fine wire mesh.
- · Keep shrubs and trees well clear of walls.
- · Keep the area around the house mown for a dis-tance of at least 20 ft, and keep the grass green if possible.
- Keep water storages • Keep water storages full and preplan how to get the water out; the electri-city supply is unlikely to be available during a serious fire. A knapsack spray pump is a good invest-

Protection body for '100 Acres

An advisory committee has been formed to protect the 100 acres of land behind Domney Reserve, Park Orchards.

Doncaster-Templestowe City Council has invited four consultants to submit proposals for the Warrandyte strategy plan by the end of this month.

Earlier this month, council adopted a brief prepared by its own officers suggesting a short list of consultants.



If you are caught by a fire while driving a vehicle: Pick the clearest area available and pull up on the side farthest from the fire; side farthest from the fire; stop the engine; wind up all the windows and shut ven-tilators; shelter below the level of the windows; cover yourself with a blanket or rug from radiant heat; wait until the fire passes.

Your best chance of survival is in the car — not out of it.

LOCAL NETBALL MAY BE DOOM

Warrandyte Netball Club may be forced to disband.

The immediate future of the sport in this town goes on the line early

As a result, all positions in the club's continued existence now hinges on a meeting called for February 13 next year at the North Warrandyte Community Centre.

"It is staggering that a club with 90 registered players can muster a roll-up of only 14 at its annual meeting," a club retiring official told the Diary.

"We have 60 registered."

"We have 60 registered juniors — so where were the parents?

"February's meeting is the second and last chance.

"All committee positions must be filled and we also need coaches, umpires and team mothers. team mothers.

"Unless we get the necessary support, we will have no alternative than to disband."

It would be a tragedy, be official said, if this happened.

"Such a lot of hard work has gone into making net-ball so strong and popular in this town," she said. "It is a great pity that the enthusiasm shown on the court is nowhere near matched off-court."

Continuing a series on Warrandyte's wildflowers, by JAN McDONALD and DAVID CAMERON.

The first hot spells of summer wither the colourful wildflower dis-play which so character-ises the box-stringybark forests of Warrandyte in Sentember October September-October.

But the warmer weather also calls forth a second rainbow of wild-flowers, including new members such as Blue Pincushion, Black Wat-tle, the magnificent but short-lived Sun-orbids short-lived Sun-orchids, and an array of Daisies.

Many of the important native grasses also come to their flowering peak.

Of the 18 wattle varieties found in Warran-dyte, only Black Wattle (Acacia mearnsii) is in full flower in Novem-

Most wattles are now at the end of their sea-son, although the Lightwood (A. implexa) will not flower until midsummer.

Black Wattle rarely forms more than a small tree or straggly, slender shrub in Warrandyte. It is often associated with the dense fire-regrowth thicket which can tem-

replace porarily forest or w after severe fire. woodland

In districts such as Gippsland, however, it can become a shapely forest tree 20 to 25m high when protected long enough from fire.

In South Africa, where it is cultivated in plantations for its excel-lent tan-bark, it reaches

It has hard, dark-brown bark and, as axebrown bark and, as axe-men know only too well, a tough, springy and re-silient timber which blunts both axe and chainsaw. Foliage is dark green and finely divided and the flower-balls rather pale yellow.



GOLD PIONEER RECALLED ...

Sir — Audrey Cahn's letter to the Editor (September Diary) clearly illustrates the importance of historical societies and their records of local history.

The land referred to was part of a cattle run established by Henry Frencham in 1854. He also became manager of the Magnet Gold Mining Company.

He died at the age of 81 in Richmond in 1897, leaving an estate of £460 to his three sons and five daughters, his wife Alicia having predeceased him.

The last of his daughters still attended the Anglican Church in the 1950's.

The Australian Dictionary of Biography Vol. 4 gives the story of his gold digging activities in the Plenty Ranges and Forest Creek (Castlemaine) where he claimed the government reward, but this was not granted.

Frencham also claimed to have taken part in the Bendigo demonstration against the £3 gold licence.

A Select Committee appointed by the government in 1890 was presented with 12 claims other than Frencham's.

Although his claim to be the discoverer of the Bendigo field was not sus-




