The league urges all in-terested local residents to attend.

"There has been a lot of speculation over the past few months on Yarra Street's future," a WEL spokesman told the Diary. "We think it is time to clear the air.

"And we hope the public meeting will do it."


The modern, air-con-ditioned premises were rebuilt at a cost of \$145,000.

"We believe all three accidents could have been avoided if the lighting had been better."






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BENTWOOD ROCKERS YOUTH CLUB HITS ROCK BOTTOM



COUNCIL CHIEF HITS **'GLOOM PROPHETS'**

Eltham Shire president Robert Marshall has hit out at the "prophets of financial gloom".

"If people have heeded the nonsense and hysteria that has been spoken and written, they would believe that this council is on the financial skids," Cr. Mar-Cr. Marshall told the Diary.

"It is simply not so!" Cr. Marshall was talking about the council's much-publicised deficit.

"I am tired of hearing from ex-councillors espe-cially — about our so-called diabolical financial situa-tion," he said.

"I would like them to look at the records and see for themselves who accumu-lated the deficit and who has been paying it off.

"These are the facts: "In seven out of the 11 years from 1964, the shire finished the with a deficit. the trading year

"This was when we were on the financial skids. "In 1975-76-77 we fin-ished with a surplus.

"In 1975, the council started a thorough review of the state of accounts.

"It found that in preced-ing years, \$257,866 had not been set aside — as it should have been — for such items as staff long-service leave, plant replace-ment and private street construction.

"So this figure then had to be added to the accu-mulated deficit.

"It took the deficit up to \$600,306.

"It has since been steadi-ly reduced to \$450,000. "By the end of Septem-ber this year it should be down to about \$300,000. "In two years after that

"In two years after that we should have wiped it out altogether."

Cr. Marshall said that in line line with its restructuring policy, the shire had decided to rationalise and streamline council procedure.

It had replaced the threecommittee system with two committees — one dealing with finance, works, build-ing and health, the other with social and physical planning.

Instead of three councillors sitting on each com-mittee we will now have four or five," Cr. Marshall said.

"This in turn will mean less argument in the council chamber and fewer, but m o r e constructive, meetings.

"We have also placed routine matters in the hands of council officers rather than have them waste the decision-making time of the council itself."

The State Health Depart-ment, reflecting a cut-back last year in finances from the State and Federal Governments, has deferred issuing a capital grant to the kindergarten until July.

This is despite popula-tion growth figures favour-ing a third kindergarten in Warrandyte, and Eltham Shire Council's approval of plans for alterations to the North Warrandyte Com-munity Centre to house Yarra View.

If the capital grant goes through, the council will

call tenders to start work on the alterations as soon as possible and the kinder-garten will open in February next year.

Otherwise, funds raised over the past 15 months will be used to establish a com-munity service which War-randyte children can utilise.

If Yarra View is to go ahead, the present commit-tee will retire in July and call for the formation of a new committee of parents whose children will use the kindergarten.



They hope to start work n the building by mid-June.


