Mr. Collins, a real estate salesman for Peter McDougall and Asso-ciates, was hit while cross-ing the road on his way to work.


The car, driven by a Croydon man, then struck a pole outside Getson Motors.

Stiggant corner needs improvement, and Doncaster-Templestowe City Council has acknowledged the need to have the junc-tion of Harris Gully Road and Yarra Street examined for a possible relocation. Commendably, the Council agreed last month to promote Reynolds Road as a bypass road and seek its upgrading to a primary arterial road. This concept was accepted by the State Government three years ago in the Eastern Corridor Study, but not acted upon. but not acted upon.

It is the responsibility of all drivers to exercise caution, speed moderation and courtesy at all times.

Obviously, any decisions concerNing road improvement and traffic control need to be carefully considered.

But, given that Warrandyte has big problems both during the week and at weekends, when the tourists flock here, it is time the authorities took deliberate, decisive and efficient action. There are no warning signs along Yarra Street. The camber on the river side of decisive and efficient action.



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

HALL ROAD STILL A DEATH-TRA

South Warrandyte Primary School has called for urgent action to ease the dangerous traffic problem in Hall Road.

Following accident an rear the school, the school c o u n c i 1 has again approached Doncaster-Templestowe City Council for urgent steps to be taken taken.

Although traffic islands ere put in to limit traffic were put using Hall Road instead of Warrandyte-Ringwood Road, the last traffic count (in August 1978) showed

that 1936 vehicles still used Hall Road daily, while 2000 used the other. Council submitted an application to ROSTA for Government funding of a crossing supervisor, but the numbers of children using the crossing are still not sufficient for this sufficient for this.

Council has offered to pay half the cost of \$35 weekly for a supervisor, but

this expense is out of the question for the small school.

A meeting is to A meeting is to be arranged for residents, school council representa-tives, ward councillors and the Member for Warran-dyte, Mr. Norman Lacy, to discuss the problem.

Meanwhile, Brackenbury Street, Warrandyte, is to be one-way between Anderson and Forbes Streets.

The council is erecting the appropriate signs fol-lowing a request from the Warrandyte Primary School the council.

It is hoped that this move will ease the hap-hazard and dangerous after-school traffic snarl.

Strategy plan gets moving

The consultative committee may be composed of seven representatives from local groups with diversified interests, plus two members of the general public and two councillors.

Several teams look possi-bilities for the finals at this stage, especially the men's over-30s and C-grade mid-week sides.


