Market's a goer

Warrandyte's longawaited community market got off the ground this month and looks here to stay!

The success of the first market on February 2 left little doubt that Warrandyte residents would support it on a permanent basis.

Organisers of the project
— which had been on the
drawing board for 18
months — were delighted
by the response.

"We had 27 stalls more than we'd expected the goods on sale were of extremely high standard and business was brisk," an organiser told the Diary.

"The crowd was consistently good from the time we opened at 9.30 a.m. until the noon closing time."

The market has been approved by Doncaster-Templestowe City Council on a three-month trial.

Its wares typify Warrandyte — handcrafts, pottery, leatherwork, stuffed toys, fresh fruit and vegetables.

The next market is on March 1.

"As the name suggests, this a community market," the organiser said.

"We urge those groups who hold occasional stalls in the main shopping centre on Saturday mornings to join us."

DEATH OF MICK JOHANSEN

Warrandyte lost one of its most colourful and best-loved identities with the death of Mick Johansen.

Mr. Johansen died suddenly just after Christmas. He was 83.

Mick Johansen lived in Warrandyte for all but the first four years of his life.

His parents moved to their 20-acre South Warrandyte selection in 1896, bringing their two-roomed house from North Fitzroy on the back of a dray.

The track to their house has since been known as Johansen's Lane and Johanson's Road.

The family tried everything — apple orchards, wood-carting, strawberry-farming as well as working in gold mines at Smith's Gully.

Mick was the last person out of the Caledonia mine in Warrandyte.

Mick was a funloving man, admitting to being a bit "wild" in his young days.

He told the tale that his mother used to remove his and his brothers' braces when they were visiting. With one hand needed to hold up the pants, the amount of mischief they could get into was minimised.

The name Mick Johansen will long be recalled whenever Warrandyte's true old-timers are discussed.

Keep out!

Children are risking serious injury by using a car body dump at the top of Webb St. as a playground.

And irresponsible residents are using the dump for household rubbish disposal.

The situation has lent a sour note to Warrandyte Environment League's highly-successful "Operation Bodysnatch" on December 2.

More than 60 car bodies lifted from the Warrandyte bush are awaiting crushing and removal, but this has been delayed by the breakdown of a mobile crusher offered by Simsmetal Pty Ltd. when the operation was being planned.

The crusher is expected to be operating within the next few weeks.

But in the meantime, WEL urges parents to keep their children away from the dump.

"There is a serious risk of injury to kids playing on and around the stacked

car wrecks," a spokesman told the Diary.

"And people depositing their household rubbish there are wasting their time.

"When the crusher arrives, it will handle only the car bodies," he said.

After much lobbying, Hurstbridge Bus Co. has extended its operations in this area on a trial basis.

BUSHFIRES

DANGER STILL ACUTE

Warandyte's three brigades have attended several fires since Christmas.

And they warn residents that the high-danger period is still to come.

"It would be foolish indeed to be lulled into a false sense of security by the relatively cool January we experienced," a brigade officer told the Diary.

"We have weeks ahead." dangerous

Residents are urged to clear rubbish and mow nature strips around houses river frontages.

Firebreaks provide refuge areas if smoke from a bush-fire impedes evacuation.

It is safer to remain in a stationary car in a fire-break than to drive into thick smoke.

Residents with river frontages are urged to clear their foreshores of rubbish and at least mow clear strips down to the river to prevent a fire from spread-ing to adjoining blocks.

North Warrandyte Fire Brigade has been particu-larly busy with its con-trolled burn-offs of road-sides and rubbish on

The work has been done in conjunction with Eltham Shire Council's slashing program, creating fire-breaks which link natural and existing clearings.

Anybody over 14 is invited to visit the fire station to see the basic workings and equipment of the brigade.

The existing services from Warrandyte to Eltham College, Diamond Technical School Creek School and Kangaroo Ground Primary School will continue and a new route — for Warran-dyte Primary School pupils and the general public came into operation on February 5.

The new service is defi-nite for the first school term. After that, it will depend upon patronage.

On the new route, the bus leaves the depot at 7.40 a.m. and runs along Research Road, reaching Blooms Road at 8.30, Kan-

garoo Ground Road at 8.34 and Pigeon Bank Lane at 8.40.

It turns at Pigeon Bank Lane and goes back along Kangaroo Ground Road to Yarra Street, Anderson Street and Brackenbury Street. terminating at the school at 8.50 a.m.

The bus will collect children and adults waiting at any point along the route.

The return trip leaves the school at 3.35 p.m., arriving at Eltham College at 4.10.

TRANSPORT FOR

Doncaster - Templestowe City Council has bought a City Council has bought a 16-seater mini-bus for the use of the frail, aged and handicapped. It will be used in addition to the Community Bus already Community Bus available to co available community groups.

The new bus will be fitted with a hydraulic lift for those in wheelchairs otherwise unable negotiate steps.

Purchased at a total cost of \$20,300, council has agreed to donate \$14,000 towards the cost of the bus.

Service clubs have pledged support and the Doncaster Senior Citizens Club has donated \$1,000.

The service will start as soon as possible after the total cost has been met and the bus completed.

Eligible Warrandyte esidents will be catered for and the isolation of War-randyte and Pork Orchards will be considered when service schedules are set.



Identity at risk
