

Eltham Shire Council has called for a unified Warrandyte.

It wants to see the split town come into the one municipality.

And it would prefer that municipality to be the Shire of Eltham.

North Riding reresentative Robert Marshall put the shire's view last month to a three-man committee of inquiry into municipal boundaries.

"I told the inquiry council held the strong view that Warrandyte should be in one municipality - not split, as it is, between Eltham shire and Doncaster-Templestowe city," Cr. Marshall told the Diary.

"Just which municipality that should be is a matter which would have to be closely studied," he said.

"But we would like to see it come to Eltham shire because we believe Warrandyte shares Eltham's philosophy."

Recommendations put to the committee of inquiry will go to the Minister for Local Government.

The Melbourne Metropolitan Board of Works and conservationists are in conflict over the sale of 40 bush blocks at the Bend of Isles, Kangaroo Ground.

The first nine blocks were offered at auction recently, but only three were sold.

The board originally bought the land for con-struction of the Yarra Brae dam, which has since been shelved.


The Bend of Isles is the

major part of an environ-mental Living Zone, a pilot scheme set up by the board in conjunction with the Ministry of Planning and Ministry of Conservation.

A suggested use for such zones is "buffer" areas be-tween national parks and developed residential or areas.

No go yet for horror road

Eltham Shire Council has moved to hasten the start of work on Research Road, North Warrandyte, between Bradleys Lane and **Banning Road.**

The stretch has been described by Royal Auto magazine as one of the worst roads in the State.

However, because of shortage of Country Roads Board funds, it is unlikely that reconstruction will start before the middle of next year.

"Research Road and "Research Road and Kangaroo Ground-Wattle Glen Road are top priority in the North Riding," councillor Robert Marshall told the Diary.

"The CRB usually subsi-dises council funds for road works on a 7-1 basis," he said, "but the CRB funds are simply not there.

"We now propose to use council loan money for land acquisition needed for reconstruction of the Research Road stretch and start work immediately start work available. become

"But even then it's un-likely work could start before mid-1981.

"It's unsatisfactory, but our hands are tied," he said.



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BUSHFIRE DEATH DANGER IGNORED

Civil defence and emergency service officers are staggered by the apparent apathy and complacency of the Warrandyte community. They are alarmed at the lack of response to their attempt to update the

evacuation register for this area.

Fear of a terrible death toll among those unable to help themselves in the event of a bushfire prompted an appeal in last month's Diary for enrolment on the register.

The appeal — by the Municipal Civil Defence and the State Emergency Service — was accompanied by a registration coupon.

It produced only a couple of responses.

"To say we are disappointed is a classic understatement," a spokesman told the Diary.

"Warrandyte has one of the highest bushfire dangers in the world and today, with the big influx of newcomers unaware of the peril, the area faces a horrifying potential for loss of life. "The whole purpose of

"The whole purpose of the evacuation register is to let the authorities how many isolated, elderly and disabled people there are in the area — and where they are.

are. "Their lives could well depend on the register."

Mr. Allan Griffiths, who is co-ordinating the updating of the register, said

there were probably more than 70 elderly or disabled residents of the area unable, or unwilling, to take part in community affairs.

"Many live with relatives who are absent at work during the day. Many are unknown to the authorities," he said.

Mr. Griffiths urged relatives or neighbours to accept responsibility for the welfare of these people by encouraging them to enrol on the register.

"If an elderly person has not been prepared psychologically for urgent evacuation, he or she may, under stress of the emergency, endanger the lives of others," he said.

He urged all elderly residents to participate in the Warrandyte Elderly Citizens' Club or at least register with the club in case of emergency.

The evacuation register enrolment coupon is reprinted above.

To register yourself, a dependent or a friend, fill in the details and post it in the Diary box, in Yarra Street.

All forms will be forwarded to Mr. Griffiths for entry on the register.

Bend of Isles resident and well-known conserva-tionist-artist Neil Douglas told the Diary:

up for sale," he said. The Bend of Isles Resi-dents' Association has the support of Healesville, Lillydale and Eltham Shires, |the Upper Yarra Valley and Dandenong Ranges Authority and the Soil Conservation Department. Department.

A spokesman for the MMBW, Mr. Len Apple, told the Diary that the board was looking very

closely at the residents' claims and would co-oper-ate closely in an attempt to meet the requirements of environmental living zone.

"Where it is definitely shown that there is a need to consolidate blocks in order to adequately provide for treatment of sewage, the board will consider offering such lots together in one parcel at any pro-posed auction, or we may consider re-subdivision," re-subdivision, consider he said.


When the Healesville Shire had not issued, or had refused, residential use permits, the board took the matter to the Appeals Tri-bunal which granted resibunal, which granted resi-dential use permits on the blocks now available for purchase.

The Upper Yarra Valley and Dandenong Ranges Authority strongly opposed the hearing. Healesville the hearing. Healesville Shire was also represented at the tribunal.

Mr. Apple said the board had waited six years to sell the land, but as it was outside the board's area of responsibility for was outside the board's area of responsibility for town planning, sewage and water supply, there was no option but to sell.

He said that if, after all avenues to gain residential use permits on the blocks failed, the public would be notified of such such information.



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



Deputation on Wards plan

Proposals for resubdivision of Doncaster-Templestowe City Council wards were dis-cussed at a top-level meeting this month.

The Minister for Local Government, Mr. Digby Crozier, met a council deputation comprising the mayor, town clerk, chief executive officer and War-randyte Ward councillors John Scott and Ian Marsden.

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


