# FROM A NEED, THE **DIARY WAS BORN**

#### The Warrandyte Diary was born because it was needed.

We came to Warrandyte early in 1969. Soon after, I read a notice in a shop window calling for people interested in forming a youth club.

I went along, wa dubbed "Publicity Officer" was

dubbed "Publicity Officer" and attempted to publicise. The local throwaway weeklies didn't want to know. They received no advertising from Warran-dyte, so why should they bother? We know other arouse

We knew other groups were having the same trouble, and the initial idea of a youth club news-letter grew into a concept for a volunteer community newsnaper newspaper.

newspaper. The club had no money at all, so the paper had to be self-supporting — per-haps even profitable! My first task was to secure advertising. I had never sold anything before and the very thought of

and the very thought of convassing for such an abstract commodity filled me with dread.

But it had to be done. I walked downhill from our home in Webb Street with knocking knees, crossed Yarra Street, took a deep breath and want into deep breath and went into Peter McDougall's office.

Peter was overwhelming in his enthusiasm for the unborn paper. He took two "spots" immediately, and they are still there. His special honour, as the

first and staunchest of our supporters, is the only space the Diary has ever

space the Diary has ever sold on Page 1. I emerged from Peter's office literally glowing. Ron Day was climbing down from the cab of his truck. A few moments of explanation and he signed up — and is still with us. Norma and Keith Webb, then running the grocery. then running the grocery, took the whole back page

in two colours — and we were away!
 And so I walked the length of Yarra Street and beyond, filling my order book and the layout sheets

of our embryo newspaper. The only refusal came The only refusal came from a restaurant proprie-tor (since left the district) who refused to advertise in a local paper because he had never had any support from local patrons. ....

The logic of his argument

I wrote and edited the first few issues alone. My wife Judy managed the paper and continued to do so for several years.

Then one day Ken McKenzie, then president of the Youth Club, intro-duced me to Peter Lovett, who lived only a few doors down.


· Cliff Green is the man who made the Warrandyte Diary happen. Now one of Australia's most successful scriptwriters, Mr. Green launched this newspaper 100 editions and almost 10 years ago. This is his story:

Peter was and still is - a real hard-nosed journ-alist, member of a proud newspaper family. The Diary matured over-

night and we became close friends with one of the warmest families in Warrandyte.

Peter and I sat side by side, at his desk or mine, hammering out the paper



night, ably the "editorial night after night, assisted by the "edit flagon" of white wine.

We measured the size of We measured the size of the paper in flagons. Nor-mally we had a one-flagon issue, but if increased ad-vertising justified more pages, we ran to a two-flagon issue. We "thundered" for

every good cause that came along — and we initiated more than one of them.

But somehow, two spe-cial responsibilities seemed to emerge: care for the environment and the wel-fare of young people.

And we had some very talented people working with us.

Who will forget the late

Harry Hudson's splendid illustrated features or Jock MacNeish's delightful cartoons?

And our printers, Bertie and Bill Barnes of Will-print, and then our own Wally Cornhill.

They knew there was something special about this one and they tolerated much and contributed a one and they tolerated much and contributed a great deal.

I managed to slide out after four hard but enjoy-able years (some still say under false pretences) and Peter Lovett was joined by Lee Tindale, another Lee professional.

Judy Macdonald and Jan Vagg have since moved up alongside Lee, and the paper goes on.

The Diary has lived be-cause it has served a real community.

It has never had any other purpose.

It has flourished because a dedicated band of people have collected the news, written the stories, edited the copy, laid out the paper, drawn the artwork, taken the photographs taken the photographs, read the proofs, sold the advertising, managed the accounts and distributed the paper.

All for free. All for the love of this special place called Warrandyte.




## DROP IN SOME TIME



## What's wrong with this town?

The report, by TRACT Consultants, contains sweeping recommendations and options for the deve-lopment and improvement of the three retail areas in the town.

The recommendations were made within the guide-lines of the Warrandyte Strategy Plan, with empha-sis on the visual and environmental assets of Warrandyte.

In their investigation, the consultants met with a steering committee, chaired by Cr. John Scott, traders, the Warrandyte Advisory Committee, the Town Planner and Engineer Committee, the T Planner and Engineer.

The report says the central shopping area should gradually change to a tourist-dominated role.

It recommends parking and pedestrian improve-ments to the area and further landscaping.

Firm recommendations are made to improve the visual impact, parking, the

strian safety facilities at the post office — east end shops. The report says these were necessary to "re-establish the identity" of that section of Warrandyte. The largely-undeveloped west end shopping area has

west end shopping area has been closely examined. Three possible options for development of retail and community service contex or a prevented

and community service centres are presented. The report concludes "it is inevitable that the west end will emerge as the main local choming and end will emerge as the main local shopping and community service area".

The report stresses that existing parking arrange-ments at all three shopping centres are inadequate

Of the foreshore, it says: "The river is a valu-able community resource that deserves better treat-ment."

Council has requested reports from the CRB and the Middle Yarra Advisory Council.

The report suggests improvements for organised parking, pedestrian paths and re-planting to prevent further erosion.

A public meeting is pro-posed for April 24 in the Mechanics Institute Hall to discuss the report.

# A glass of the Yarra?

"We realise it's an impossible dream to envis-age keeping the Yarra at Warrandyte in its present clean state," WEL repre-

Warrandyte Environment League is holding a celebration — and a wake. The people of Warrandyte are invited

to both. The functions will be combined and held midstream, upstream from the bridge at 10.30 a.m. on Saturday, April 12.

The celebration is to revel in the fact that the E coli reading at the bridge is at 71 parts per 1000mls. That's almost back to the level of eight years ago when drinking water was still drawn for War-randyte from the Yarra.

Revellers are urged to bring their own champagne glasses and sample the water . . . or bring their own champagne as well.

The event has provoked much media interest and there is to be a television coverage.
