

# SAVAGE KILLERS ON PROWL AGAIN

Warrandyte's killer have

The latest victim was Samantha, the 11 year old pet sheep of Mr. Doug Mc-Manus of Kangaroo Ground Road. She was a well-loved pet and well known to the children in the area. She was mauled one night recently and left to die in agony in her paddock, her stomach ripped open.

open.
This was no hungry animal as no attempt was made to remove any of the carcase. She was worried, mauled and left when the kill became boring.

Where was YOUR

dog that night?

"It was really an awful experience", said Mr. Mc-Manus. "It was bad enough to see what happened to our pet but it makes you worry about the safety of children in this area".

Someone in Warrandyte

Someone in Warrandyte now owns a dog, or dogs, that are killers. It is the duty of every member of this community to make sure that their dogs are kept within their own property, or to face the con-

sequences of the law. According to the Amended Dog Act of 1970, every dog over the age of six months should be registered.

If a dog is unregistered, then it may be seized and destroyed. The owner of any dog found outside his premises is liable to be fined between \$50 and \$100. Fines increase up to \$200 for dogs found wandering after dark.

The owner of any dog guilty of attacking or worrying horses, cattle, sheep or poultry is liable for damages, and also a penalty of \$200. The dog is then either destroyed or kept muzzled in a manner sufficient to prevent it. kept muzzled in a manner sufficient to prevent it causing injury by biting. In the case of a dog attacking stock in an enclosed field, then the dog may be destroyed by the owner protecting his stock.

Any person may seize a dog making a nuisance of itself and then inform the council.

If you are the owner of If you are the owner of a dog you have certain res-ponsibilities within the com-munity which you must up-hold. Otherwise not only will you suffer the legal consequences but you might be responsible for injury to innocent people. innocent people.

# Phil Irving — the world on wheels

Phil Irving, of Brackenbury Street, is quite a man.

At 78, Phil continues to enjoy his lifetime devotion to motorcycles and racing cars.

His contributions these sports span almost the entire history of their development.

As an intrepid youth, Phil was a regular com-petitor in motorcycle petitor in motorcycle reliability trials and one of his early feats involved riding 550 miles riding 550 miles over unmade roads in 24 hours.

This was one of several events which earned Phil the 1928 Australian Solo Motorcycle Championship.

In 1930, he travelled across New Zealand and Canada to the United Kingdom aboard a Vincent HRD sidecar outfit.

His companion was Englishman J. Gill who was completing an adven-turous round-world trip.

Phil sold two motor-cycles to pay for the four-month expedition and arrived in England with seven-and-six in his pocket

'This was just enough to send a telegram to my aunt and catch a bus up to London," he recalls.

"Of course this was in the midst of the depres-sion and unless you lived through it you've no idea how bad it was.

"But at least in Engand I got line of wo got a job in my work."

For the next 20 years, Phil lived in the U.K., first working as a draughtsman at Velocette Motorcycles, before joining Vincent HRD as chief designer. designer.

He later returned to Velocette where he designed apparatus still used on their machines today.

Phil's most memorable time in England was during the war.

At 78,

## finely tuned

"In 1942, the spirit of unselfishness among the people was tremendous, he says.

he says.

"They shared what little they had and just made do." Phil contributed to the war effort by using his machinery skills in equipment production. He was later involved in designing a marine airborne lifeboat for the Air Ministry.

Phil was lured back to

Phil was lured back to Australia in 1949 by a challenging design oppor-tunity at Repco Research.

It was here that he really made his name in the world of motor sport.

Enthusiasts a round Australia watched the gruelling Redex Trials and saw Phil complete the arduous course in both 1954 and 1957.

Not satisfied with just racing cars, Phil was still designing their critical working parts.

He had notable success with a special cylinder head for FJ Holdens, which dominated saloon car racing at that time.

In 1964, Phil returned to England to design the Repco-Brabham, the For-

mula One car which won World Championships in 1966 and 1967, and earned fame for driver Jack Brabham.

"Jack was the best con-structor and driver for a long time. He is a man with great respect for machinery," Phil says.

For the past two decades Phil has commuted between the U.K. and Australia as his expertise has been in demand on both sides of the globe. the globe.

He has written eight books on motorcycles which are renowned for their technical excellence as well as their ability to be read and enjoyed by any bike lover.

His magazine articles, written under the penname "Slide Rule" delighted bike riders for many years.

After such a distinguished career it is not easy to list all of the accolades that have been bestowed on Phil Irving.

The Confederation of Australian Motor Sport showed their esteem in 1971. Phil Irving and Jack Brabham were the first to be awarded the CAMS Membership of Honour for long and valuable ser-vice to Australian motor sport.

The 1977 New Year's Day Honours awarded Phil the MBE for his contributions to society.

He is still world president of the Vincent Owners' Club and patron of both the Vintage Motorcycle Club and

Warrandyte has every reason to be prould of Phil Irving.





The State Electricity Commission needs to keep trees clear of overhead lines for three very good reasons: 1. to ensure public safety;

to prevent bushfires; to prevent accidental supply interruptions.

Warrandyte is regarded as being a fire prone area and I am sure that many longer term residents will attest to the consequences resulting from bush fires resulting from bush fires which have occurred in the area over the years.

### **READERS'** LETTERS

We carry out our tree We carry out our tree cutting in accordance with a code of practice which was prepared jointly by the State Electricity Commission, Municipal Association of Victoria with the assistance of the Local Government Engineer's

Association and the Royal Institute of Parks and Recreation.

It is worth noting here that the Municipal Association represents 1 o c a l councils in Victoria.

Indeed in the code of practice, is provision for consultation with the council concerned.

It is true that a number of residents have undertaken to control regrowth (primarily of eucalyptus) under our lines and I anticipate that as we move through the area a number of others will be prepared to give a similar undertaking. I am confident that these undertakings will be honoured. honoured.

I can assure you the State Electricity Commission is very aware of environ-mental considerations when providing services. There are however, certain clearances and standards we are bound to maintain for the reasons stated.

With the co-operation and understanding of all concerned, we will be able to carry out this sensitive and difficult project.
