Task force set up

A public meeting held on April 27 voted overwhelmingly to form an eight member task force to prepare detailed submissions to "save Yarra Street as it is".

The meeting, attended by officers from both councils, the Yarra Street Working Party, most community groups and a full hall of local residents, debated the issues for more than three hours.

Mr. Kelvin Ward, from the Doncaster - Templz-City Council, presented the Working Party's findings and foreshadowed a "traf-fic volume of 20,000 cars per day if growth contin-ues until 1995".

Presentations were made Presentations were made by Doug Seymour (Indepen-dent), Greg Thorpe (Work-ing Party), Rob Tremberth (Post Office Preservation Group), John Addie (Envir-onment League) and a spokesman for the Country Roads Board Roads Board.

Cr. Graham Cohen, who chaired the meeting, praised these speakers for the considerable effort made to prepare their submissions.

James Troedel then pre-sented the meeting with a list of motions which were voted on as follows:

MOTION 1: Carried by

This meeting records its appreciation of the time and effort put in by all members of the Working Party, but believes that the re-

straints put on the deliber-ations of the Working Party made it impossible for a solution acceptable to the community to be found.

MOTION 2: Carried by majority.

This meeting considers This meeting considers both options described as long term by the Working Party — that is, a parking mall or a widening of the present pavement, as inconsistent with community goals

MOTION 3: Carried by

That this meeting calls on all relevant authorities to accept an immediate mora-torium on all gazettal pro-ceedings relating to Yarra Street for a period of 12 months to allow more time months to allow more time to present to Government a proposal for the conserva-tion of the present scale and streetscape of the road within Warrandyte. Further, that no works be under-taken in Yarra Street with the exception of:—

(i) The roundabout at the bridge.

(ii) A pedestrian crossing to serve the central

shops and bus stop.

(iii) General maintenance and upgrading in a sensitive manner of existing facilities and carparks.

(iv) The restoration of the Old Post Office.

MOTION 4: Carried by majority.

That this meeting states its desire that the Post Office be restored on its existing site and calls on the authorities to grant appropriate permits to the Warrandyte Post Office Preservation Group to proceed immediately due to the unstable nature of the building and the community's fears of further deterioration of the building strucation of the building structure.

MOTION 5: Carried by

That an eight member Yarra Street Task Force be formed to further the aims set out in Motions I to 4 and that the Warrandyte Advisory Committee report their findings in six months.

JOBS IN OUR TOWN

The first full time workers employed under the Employment Initiatives Program have started work at the Warrandyte Community Workshop Cooperative.

Visiting the Co-operative recently Mr. Lou Hill, the Member for Warrandyte, said that the grant had enabled the Co-operative to get three job creating projects off the ground.

He said that when the Co-operative applied for an Employment Initiatives Employment Initiatives grant it was determined to create jobs which could be self financing and not just "make work".

"We looked at local needs and services and decided that there is a ready market for child care services, mud bricks and timber fuel sales around Warrandyte".

"The \$87,000 grant will help us take on 6 unem-ployed people on these pro-jects" Mr. Hill said.

One of the new workers, Mr. Jim Lean, is a Business Manager. He will imple-ment all the Co-operative's

projects and develop a long term business plan to make them financially independ-ent of government assistance.

Ms. Anne Taylor, a qualified Mothercraft Nurse, will develop the child care service. Her first task involves meeting the Health Commission's requirements for registration. for registration.

Mr. Lean and Ms. Taylor will be joined by 4 young unemployed people shortly. Three will work on the mud

brick making and timber fuel sales and an assistant will work with Ms. Taylor while undergoing child care training.

The Chairman of the Cooperative, Mr. Robin Batty, said that the job creation projects and the grant were the result of a lot of hard work by many local people.

"I am sure that the Co-operative will have three self sustaining businesses by the end of the govern-ment funding period in Sep-tember" he said.

OLD ANTIQUES, **NEW MUSEUM**

Saturday, May 28, 1983 will be a day to remember.

Warrandyte residents, and tourists in our unique and historic town will see the Warrandyte Historical Museum open its doors to the public from 3 p.m. Thereafter the Museum will be open every Sunday from noon till 4.30 p.m. (other days by appointment).

Earlier this year the Warrandyte Historical Society transformed the old build-ings on the Community Centre site in Yarra Street by providing a working blacksmith's shop. Work on the adjoining museum, beside the Lion's Opportunity Shop, is scheduled for completion in time for the official opening on May 28.

The opening of its own museum is quite an achievemuseum is quite an achievement for the relatively young Historical Society. It was 'born' in 1976, as a result of the union of a few local people who had organised the display of historical Warrandyte data during the Warrandyte Primary School Centenary celebrations of 1975. These people were concerned that although Warrandyte had a long and colourful history, nothing had been done about it.

Warrandyte Historical So-

Warrandyte Historical Society is an affiliated member

Society of the Royal Historical Society of Victoria and it aims to preserve and spread the knowledge of our local history. To this end it has gathered hundreds of old photographs of the area and its people plus many artefacts related to the early days here. Many memories of our older residents have also been recorded. This task is a continuing one, and new members or 'leads' to historical material are always waters. ways welcome.

Now that there is a permanent area available for display of historical data, the society will gladly accept further donations or loans of artefacts and documents.

Diary that there was an extreme urgency to solve extreme urgency to solve the present conflicts be-tween pedestrian safety, car parking and through traffic in Yarra Street.

"The Task Force will need to act quickly" she said, "as there are massive changes afoot in the Coun-try Roads Board."

Cr. Martin called for an immediate gazettal of the interim car parking recommendations and restoration of the old Post Office.

Cr. Martin also confirmed that council had sufficient funds on estimate this year to complete the pedestrian crossing lights.

I was appalled at the lack of leisure time facilities that the inmates had to fill in the long hours particularly at weekends. While all medical care is given the Hospital is in need of support from the caring public.

What is Manvantara?

Manyantara is a public hospital, located at 45 Warrandyte Road, Ringwood, and is concerned with the care of aged and disabled people.

The emphasis is on rehabilitation, on family and community involvement, and getting the patient out of hospital and back home as quickly as possible. At Manvantara independence is encouraged from the earliest possible stage of treatment. In the long run, it's in the patient's best interests to do things for themselves, if a all possible.

This philosophy of self-help and rehabilitation means that elderly people who are often inappropriately placed in long-term nursing home care can now prosper in their own home environment.

Thanks to the wide range of facilities and support services, the hospital is able to make this option available to an increasing number of patients.

Community involvement is an integral part of Manvantara, and without it, services, particularly in the Day Centre which is run almost completely by voluntary helpers, would be greatly diminished.

The Manvantara Auxiliary, which was formed just over a year ago, helps the hospital in many ways. However, new members are always welcome to assist with further activities and fund-raising projects to buy much-needed equipment.

00 minutes on the bus

In desperation of the rest of the year on endless boring trips on the Warrandyte / Melbourne bus, I wrote to the Minister for Transport, Steve Crabb inviting him to come, any day, and experience first-hand the inefficiency of State enterprise for himself. self.

It followed an arduous and frustrating one hour and forty minutes bus trip to the city in peak hour, not the one hour that the previous state Liberal government promised us when the freeway (F19) was opended... a fast efficient service with special bus lanes.

Well, that has not yet eventuated, even given this government's commitment to upgrading public trans-port.

The Director General for Transport, A. S. Reiher points out, however sympathetically, that there will be no express city bus from Warrandyte because of insufficient patronage. What sufficient patronage. What does he expect, when the service is so appalling?

In the past bus travellers

have organised petitions for a better service, . . . and this time it seems as if we are going to get nothing

So the next time you have to sit in the bus for an hour and a half, or more, think of Steve Crabb in the comfort of his chauffeur driven ministerial vehicle, and drop him a line telling him what you think.

The official reply there is still much to be done

Dear Mls. Shaw.

My Minister has asked me to thank you for your letter of 9 February 1983 and for your comments on the Warrandyte bus service.

The normal running time from Warrandyte Bridge to Melbourne via the arterial route is 77 minutes. This is the average time taken by all buses within a prescribed period of the day. Some buses may, however, take longer than the rostered running time, depending on the degree of traffic congestion encountered along the route

Recent passenger checks taken by the Tramways Board have indicated insufficient patronage from the Warrandyte to the City and there are, of course, many passengers from the Warrandyte area whose destinations lie within the Doncaster, Templestowe and North Balwyn areas. It would be impractical to exclude these people from the through service.

There is extensive research presently being undertaken into ways of improving the public transport system. The reduction of travel times is of the highest priority and while progress has been achieved in some areas, we are conscious that there is still much to be done in order to attain the desired level of service.

I am sorry that you have had difficulty with the service.

DONCARE — caring

for Warrandyte too

Doncare has been serving the Doncaster and Templestowe City and surrounding regions for 12 years. It has an unusual and exciting philosophy of service by the community for the community.

There are two major aspects of Doncare's services. It is a Citizens Advice Bureau and a Counselling Service. Both are staffed by trained volunteers who are supervised and have regular ongoing training from staff back-up personnel.

The Citizens Advice Bureau (C.A.B.) has extensive information about this area and other areas of Melbourne and acts as an information and referral service. Very straight forward and very complex issues are dealt with. This service is often used as a crisis service for people who are isolated, depressed, suicidal or whose family network is breaking up.

The counselling service includes personal, marital and family counselling on a short term and medium term basis and also acts as a referral service for spe-

cialist counselling needs such as drug and alcohol addiction.

Community Education Programs are organised from time to time.

Doncare is funded by its own fund raising efforts (mainly through Opportunity Shops), the City of Doncaster and Templestowe Council and special grants from the Department of Community Welfare Services and other State Government Departments.

Over the years Warrandyte residents have used Doncare's services and staffed its volunteer ranks. This is an association which we value and hope to expand.



All residents are welcome to participate in the programme and are able to enrol and receive information through the Community Education Officer on 844-2985.


Classes will be offered in Guitar, Piano, Drums, Recorder, Flute, Violin, Percussion and Developmental Music.
