The old Post Office and Yarra Street may be preserved because of their "special interest" qualities following a meeting between the Yarra Street Task Post Force, the Office Preservation Group, and the State Government.

The meeting, with the inister for Transport, Minister for Mr. Crabb, and the Minfor Planning, Mr. Walker, was arranged by the Member for Warwas arranged randyte, Mr. Hill.

Mr Hill told the Diary that the meeting was intended to get the Ministers' help in persuading the Country Roads Board to allow restoration of the Post Office to proceed on the present site.

"Mr. Crabb will investi-gate proposals to restore the old Warrandyte Post Of-fice and will review the possibility of zoning War-randyte an Area of Special Interest for the preservation of Yarra Street", Mr Hill said said.

The Post Office is partly situated on a road reserva-tion and restoration cannot commence without the per-mission of the CRB.

Mr Hill said: "After listening to the compelling arguments of the Preservation Group and the Task Force, the Ministers appreciated the historical importance of the Poet Office and ance of the Post Office and the Yarra Street streetscape.

"The Ministers agreed to examine ways and means of restoring the building while the reservation is in force, on the understanding that it could be moved in the future, if necessary.

"They are making every effort to find an acceptable solution".

The Task Force was set up last month to preserve the historic Warrandyte street-scape and the 100-year-old Post Office which was damaged in a fire last year.



Council vote on

consider a provisional permit development granted to Ilya Kostezky and Associates covering Professor's Hill in North

Professor's Hill in North Warrandyte.

Council's planning committee recently decided to recommend approval for a sub-division of 32 allotments, a decision that has been vigorously opposed by the Warrandyte Environment League

been vigorously opposed by the Warrandyte Environment League.

Now, after a meeting attended by Mr. Kostezky, council officials, WEL, the Warrandyte Advisory Committee, Mr. Robert Middleton (for protesters) and Mr David Cameron, a local botanist, council will vote on the issue. WEL, WAC, and objectors want council to reduce the sub-division to the previously - approved 15 allotments.

Also, Councillor Robert Marshall says that council wants to preserve part of the hill. "The council is attempting to buy public open space at present. They want to incorporate the top of the hill as part of this space to assist in preserving the area," he says.

Cr. Marshall, who attended the recent meeting course.

Cr. Marshall, who attended the recent meeting, says:
"There has been no indication of which way the vote will go, but I know of four votes, including my own, that will go against this enormous sub-division."

Cr. Marshall said the meeting on June 15 was aimed at getting a compromise with Kostezky and Associates. "Mr. Kostezky and Associates. "Mr. Kostezky and in the will not consider sub-dividing the hill into 15 allotments,

which would provide from 1½ to three and four-acre blocks."

Reports by the Soil Con-servation Authority were used as evidence at the meeting against the 32-block sub-division.

Cr. Marshall says: "The reports indicated that 45 per cent of the area would be damaged if development proceeded at the present stage. It would cause severe environmental damage and mass erosion".

The WEL secretary, Janette Vagg, says: "WEL is adamant in its belief that the granting of this particular permit by council would

intention of the Residential "D" zoning.

"The gravity of the impli-cations for planning policy for North Warrandyte can-not be over - emphasised. They would be far-reaching because of the precedent it would set. We have stated that we accept inevitability of sub-division of this land, but we expect council to adof sub-division of this land, but we expect council to ad-here to its commitment of maintaining North Warran-dyte as an area of bushland interest, and not jeopardise existing policy".





Not many people go to prison for their principles. Knocker Foley did.

It happened a while back, when the Great Breathalyzer Blitz was in full blast and the police decided to concentrate on Warrandyte one Friday night. They had the place sealed up like Berlin during the blockade.

We came drifting down Melbourne Hill in the old Merc, into a pocket of fog by the Recreation Reserve, across the creek and up over the rise. And there they were: divvy vans, patrol cars and motorcycles; flashing blue lights and signalling torches. We thought at least half of 'H' division at Pentridge had made the break and headed for the hills.

"By hell, youse blokes've got a helluva liberty," Knocker shouted as he walked uncertainly up to a broadbeamed sergeant. "Where d'yer think this is, flamin' Queensland?" The broadbeamed sergeant beamed sergeant beamed. Queensland?" The broad-beamed sergeant beamed broadly and told Knocker how much they appreciated his attitude of responsible citiizenship, leaving his non-articulated vehicle in the precincts of the licensed premises and walking home and everything. and everything.



A meeting between football club officials within the municipality and the Doncaster and Templestowe City Council on 2 June resolved the issue of the proposed high rentals of the Warrandyte Football Club ground for this year.
