

Financed solely through advertising, it guards its not-for-profit, non-commercial status and its independent voice. The Diary carries a strong editorial bias towards the people, environment and character of the place it serves. Its monthly circulation is 4000 copies and it is available in Warrandyte, North Warrandyte, South Warrandyte, Park Orchards, Wonga Park, Warrandwood, North Ringwood, Kangaroo Ground and Research

#### A SPECIAL PLACE

Warrandyte (approximate population 8000) is situated on the Yarra River, some 27km from Melbourne. For countless ages a well-stocked hunting ground of the Wurundjeri people, in 1851 Warrandyte became the site of the first official gold discovery in Victoria. It soon established its character as a small, self-sustaining community set in a beautiful river valley. Around 1900 the miners, orchardists and tradespeople were joined by a number of young painters who were founding the Australian nationalist arts tradition. Now a commuter suburb of Melbourne, the natural beauty, community spirit and sense of independence of Warrandyte has been largely retained. This newspaper is the voice and true expression of that spirit.

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


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

Neville wiggle-fingered towards the couch.


"The one that was under the washing machine to stop it jiggling? I pulled it out this morning when the bathmat got tangled in the pulsator and the water overflowed."

# When fire strikes

Just six weeks on from the Kanga-roo Ground blaze, described as the "most significant fire in this area since 1991," local CFA captains want to know if anyone is paying attention.

attention.
Although there's been little local fire activity, Warrandyte brigades have been actively involved further afield at other fire fronts including Arthurs Creek and Donnybrook. The latter, which reached the northern metropolitan suburb of Epping, burned over 2000 hectares in less than three hours.

than three hours.
This seems to have had some impact on people's awareness according to North Warrandyte CFA captain Rohan Thornton, who believes that there have been "more questions" from the community and a renewed level of concern". He is quick to point out, however, that summer isn't over and many people still don't have a fire plan. It's not

It's not a question of if but when a bushfire impacts Warrandyte, according to South Warrandyte captain Greg Kennedy, who urges: "Get a plan! Don't wait until there's a fire in your street. People need to prepare

which is the properties, prepare themselves and pay attention.

"A plan is not a plan until it's written down—if it's in your head, it's just an intention."

A Stony Creek Road resident agrees with this view and shared her experi-

ence on the day of the recent Kangaroo Ground blaze with the *Diary*:
"We had left early as it was a high
fire danger day but returned around
5pm to prepare the evening meal and
get the kids settled. We did not have
a written plan and I didn't check the CFA website or my emails—which contained a notice from local fire

phone tree group.

"I was unaware of any fire activity until I went inside and found a phone message from a friend telling me a fire in Kangaroo Ground Road had escalated. I always thought that planning to leave early would be enough. Our keepsakes were packed and ready but when I got the call, I panicked and left everything.

"My husband was still at work and I just couldn't think straight. I managed to get the kids and dog into the car but when I got to the end of our street, I found a traffic jam and, unlike the usual Warrandyte traffic

unlike the usual Warrandyte traffic etiquette, no one was letting anyone in. It was extremely stressful and

the fire hadn't even reached Warrandyte," she said.

Local CFA captains want to see everyone implement plans to deal with warrandyte. with unexpected contingencies such as family members at different loca-tions, traffic issues and details such tions, traffic issues and details such as who is responsible for bringing hard drives, photos or pets. They say a penned fire plan is the only way to galvanise actions in people's minds and provide a clear process to follow when leaving early is unfeasible. Both CFA captains applauded the Be Ready Warrandyte program's recent video release, *Do you have a fire plan?* which is a satirical look at the fundamental difficulties in the absence of a bushfire plan. They say

absence of a bushfire plan. They say they hope the video, in conjunction with recent fire activity, brings home white cent he activity, brings home the importance of fire preparedness. The Be Ready Warrandyte's recent survey does not seem to reflect this, however, with only 10 per cent of Warrandyte households indicating having documented bushfire plans.

people who say they have a survival plan actually have no idea what to do if some-



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



## **Ceremony for Wurundjeri** memories at Pound Bend

An historical community partnership event has been scheduled to take place on Saturday, March 23, as part of the Warrandyte Festival.

Two bronze plaques will be unveiled to commemorate the last great inter-tribal corroboree hosted by the Wurundjeri people in the Pound Bend area of Warrandyte in 1852.

The ceremonial unveiling of both plaques is a joint effort of the Wurundjeri Tribal Council, Reconciliation Manningham and Nillumbik Reconciliation Group.

Last year, a Welcome to Country by a Wurundjeri Elder was included as part of the opening of the War-

by a Wurundjeri Elder was included as part of the opening of the Warrandyte Festival.

Audiences gathered at Stiggants Reserve to watch a smoke/gum leaf ceremony and hear traditional story telling of the beginnings of Warrandyte and the Yarra River.

Much enjoyed by festivalgoers, the Welcome to Country and smoking ceremony have been scheduled again this year at noon on the Main Stage.

The historical plaque unveiling ceremony will take place later at two separate sites, marking the boundaries of the 1908-acre Aboriginal

Reserve that covered both sides of the Yarra. Joy Dahl for Reconciliation Man-

Joy Dahl for Reconciliation Manningham spoke to the *Diary* about this significant event.

"The unveilings will be a great opportunity for locals who don't already have that knowledge, to learn about some of Warrandyte's early Aboriginal history.

"Back in 1852, a great corroboree of the Kulin nation was held at Pound Bend. Many traditional games were played as part of the two-week long festivities, which essentially represented a windup of Wurrundjeri living freely on their traditional land," Ms Dahl said.

She explained that the 1852 corro-

She explained that the 1852 corroboree was a "symbolic act" by headman of the Wurundjeri, Simon Wonga,

in the face of changing times.

Described by historians as "visionary", Wonga was determined to set ary", Wonga was determined to set up an economic base by which his people could prosper, however it took him another decade to secure a grant of land for this purpose. Wonga and first cousin William Barak, who succeeded him as headman, finally led their people to take up a land grant at Coranderrk in Healesville, in 1863. The unveiling of the "south side" plaque by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Bill Nicholson will take place at 1.30pm at the Taroona Avenue/Everard Drive car park entrance to Stiggants Reserve (Melway ref: 23 C9).

The second unveiling on the porth

The second unveiling, on the north side of the Yarra will follow at 2.30pm and will be conducted by Wurundjeri Elder Aunty Di Kerr.

"We invite adults and children to come and be part of this commemoration, and witness a new moment in Warrandyte Wurundjeri history," Ms Dahl said. "The ceremony will be attended by traditional dancers, enriched by knowledgeable storytelling."

To take part in the second scheduled unveiling, participants will need to go by car. This site is located in North Warrandyte, at the river end of The Boulevard, off Warrandyte Research Road, at the confluence of Stony Creek and the Yarra. A car park is next to the unveiling site (Melway ref: 23 C12).

# Melbourne Hill ready for battle

A group of Warrandyte residents have declared they will fight Manningham council's \$1.9 million proposal to install drains and kerb-and-channel in part of the Melbourne Hill Road catchment.

Residents said the cost, lack of consultation and fears the proposal would ruin the amenity of the area are among their reasons for opposing the drainage plan.

Council hopes to recover \$900,000 from residents. This would affect residents in nearby streets, including Lorraine Avenue and Drysdale Road.

Lorraine Avenue resident Peter Healers and to install the majority.

Lorraine Avenue resident Peter Hookey said the majority of residents felt the proposal

or residents left the proposal was excessive.

"It's an overkill and there is absolutely no need to touch Lorraine Avenue," he said.

"We have people who have been living here for 50 years and they're walking around so upset and so disappointed it has come to this and I have has come to this, and I have never seen them like that

before."
Council engineers said drains were needed to significantly reduce the risk of flooding for houses at the bottom of the hill. Six houses were flooded in the downpour of 2011, causing thousands of dollars damage to properties at the bottom of the catchment.

ment.

Many residents say the proposal's price tag, which council estimated would be between \$5000 and \$15,000 per household, is too high.

Council's chief executive officer, Joe Carbone, said council had already increased its contribution to the project. He also said it was likely council would offer loans to residents with quarterly instalments

would ofter loans to residents with quarterly instalments over 10 years.
However, Drysdale Road pensioners Carole and Alf Adins said they couldn't afford to pay back a loan.
"Why should residents have to take out a loan and pay

to take out a loan and pay interest? As pensioners, that hits us hard," Carole said.

"We can't afford to pay off a loan, not on what we get and especially not after paying for roads and drainage previ-

our roads and drainage previously."

The couple said they had also installed water tanks to collect excess water that would otherwise run down into the catchment, and felt other residents should do

A number of residents told the *Diary* they had rarely seen council doing maintenance work on the open drains, which are full of leaf litter and

debris.

They said council should focus on regularly clearing debris and building culverts beneath driveways to a standard diameter before considering the current proposal.

However, Mr Carbone said council did try maintaining the catchment and had run out of options to continue maintenance works on a sys-

maintenance works on a sys tem that had inadequate exist-ing infrastructure. "Modifications to improve

the capacity of the open drains would likely result in excessively deep channels close to roads which then pose a hazard to motorists," he said.

Mr Hookey said he sympathised with households at risk of flooding, but felt others shouldn't have to pay for mistakes council made decades ago.

decades ago.
"There are two houses in
Melbourne Hill Road which

Melbourne Hill Road which were built on an old dam and the council back then allowed these properties to be built along a natural watercourse without proper follow-up," he said.

Former councillor David Ellis from the Warrandyte Community Association said the association would monitor the situation closely to ensure the interests of the Warrandyte community are taken into account.

Residents have received

Residents have received survey forms and council will consider community opinion at its March meeting.

This charge only applies to checkout bags, not small

"Other shops are switching to paper and again asking shoppers to bring their own bags," Ms Edmonds said.

All profits from the supermarket's 10c fee will go to

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

# Zoning future looks brighter

As the *Diary* goes to print, sweeping reforms to the state's residential planning zones are being finalised, with implementation due to commence in a matter of months

months.
State government has reported that 2000 submissions were received state-wide as part of their consultation on proposed planning reforms late last year.
The Warrandyte Community Association lodged a submission containing over 300 written objections from concerned residents.
"The Coalition government's

concerned residents.
"The Coalition government's reforms to residential zones reflect what communities have been calling for, for many years—certainty for neighbourhoods and protection from inappropriate development," planning minister

Matthew Guy said.

Minister Guy claims the reforms will protect streetscapes, amenity and liveability.

"At the same time the new zones will clearly define the appropriate locations where growth and density should occur," Mr Guy said.

The government's Ministerial Advisory Council (MAC) on zone reform has suggested a number of improvements to the residential zones as initially proposed in 2012; a move they say will ensure the protection of community amenity and provide clearer rules and greater certainty for the community.

rules and greater certainty for the community. "The improvements recom-mended by the MAC further protect residential amenity and neighbourhood charac-ter and are supported by the coalition government," Mr Guy said Guy said.

Importantly for Warrandyte, the MAC has reported that all existing Bushfire Management Overlays would be upheld and would trump any changes to zones, making specific refer-ence to Warrandyte. "For example in some parts

of Warrandyte, where the risk from bushfire is significant, an application for subdivision or a new dwelling on a lot of 0.4 hectares or greater would not comply with the requirements of the Bushfire Management

Overlay," the report states.

State government claims
the new Neighbourhood Residential Zone will provide the
strongest protections for local neighbourhood character
for the first time in Victoria's

planning history.
"Local communities will now know and clearly understand where growth can and will occur" Mr Guy said. Late last year, local MP Ryan Smith told the *Diary* that by placing greater planning controls in the hands of local government, there will be a shift away from a "cookie-cutter approach" to planning. "Importantly, these zones will be at the discretion of local council and it will predominately be the view of the local community that informs which zone should be applied where", Minister Guy said.

Mr Smith has advised that submissions will be made available online after all zones, not just residential, have been finalised.

"The club was men only until the late 1990s when women were admitted as members. In 1996 Liz Wood, a local resident, was elected first female president of the club. Liz has been the secretary/treasurer for many years and is a point of contact for the club.

"We now have equal numbers of male and females in the club with members assisting the committee to organise

ing the committee to organise the meetings, which are held on the second Tuesday of every month except January. Cost of the meeting is \$85 a head which includes food and wine."

There is an annual fee of \$50, used to subsidise various more expensive venues. Elections are held yearly for selection of president, treasurer, secretary and committee members.

"Where possible we hold the meetings in the local Warrandyte area, Ms Spurrell said. "The club has visited Thyme on the Terrace, Vanilla Orchid, Bolero's and Mercers to name a few.

# Lions launch world-wide membership drive

"We run 'In The Driver's Seat', which is a day for the vision-impaired, enabling them to drive a car around the Sandown circuit," Mr Dobbs said.

Some years the local Lions run a debutante ball for local secondary students "and every year we take a bunch of kids with cancer away to Eildon for a watersports weekend.
"We run the Warrandyte Youth of The Year Quest the vision and hear.

The Year Quest, the vision and hear-ing testing of our local school kids in their early years and the Warrandyte Youth Arts Award in recognition of Warrandyte's past connections with

Warrandyte's past connections with the arts.

"In partnership with Vermont Lions, we run a charity golf day which currently supports the Cerebral Palsy Education Centre. We also support disadvantaged kids to go to Licola, the Lions township. In addition we help those less fortunate than ourselves whether through sickness, disability or hardship by giving help when and where it's needed."

Warrandyte Lions performed a sterling effort during the Black Saturday bushfire disaster, gathering truckloads of emergency clothing and other goods, raising money



and rebuilding fencing destroyed

by the fire.

"The club might receive sponsorship for some of our projects but other than that we do it on our

own," Mr Dobbs said. "Needless to say, our members do this without charge to the club and that brings me to the crux of our problem. We do not really have enough active members to maintain the things we do. We have 35 members, and ironi-cally about half of them don't live in Warrandyte.

"Other nearby clubs such as Tem-plestowe and Doncaster no longer have Lions clubs and we are de-termined this will not happen in Warrandyte.

# CA talks to council

Bushfires, drainage, the Warrandyte Community Centre, planning and road safety for kids crossing roads were raised in a meeting between Manningham councillors and officers and the Warrandyte Community Association early last month.

CA president, Dick Davies, said that the association pleased with the profes sional way councillors and officers handled these six-monthly meetings, which he described as an opportunity to explore issues of importance to both.

"None is more pressing than raising the level of awareness for fire planning, given the recent Kangaroo Ground fire less than four the less than f kilometres from the Bridge," Mr Davies said.
"The 'Be Ready Warran-

"The 'Be Ready Warrandyte' fire plan campaign is going well having completed a Bushfire Survey Findings

a Bushfire Survey Findings report.
"A video produced with the Warrandyte Theatre Company promotes fire planning. The video and a 'typical' fire plan, tailored for Warrandyte, is available on the website www.warrandyte. org.au."

randyte, is available on the website www.warrandyte. org.au."

Several other activities are planned. Potential funding beyond August 2013, when the current grant runs out, was also discussed.

The Be Ready Warrandyte project is funded by a Victorian Government Fire Ready Communities Grant to the WCA from the Department of Planning and Community Development, and supplemented by funds from Manningham and Nillumbik councils, Warrandyte Community Bank and the Community Market Committee.

Council briefed on the

Council briefed on the proposed special drainage charge scheme for the Melbourne Hill Road area.
"WCA's understanding is

that this is just the beginning of a process to develop a response to prepare for projected increased flood severity," Mr Davies said.

Council advised that the community will be properly consulted and advised at every step of the planning process including on issues of environmental appearance and amenity. WCA will be informed of all further developments. Former councillor David Ellis is handling this issue for WCA, which is acting as a communication channel and conduit to Manningham and conduit to Manningham

council.

The draft management plan for the Warrandyte Commu-nity Centre refurbishment is completed and will be dis-


completed and will be distributed. Three meetings are planned by the end of July. A reference group will be formed which includes WCA. The first meeting is on March 19.

Plaques commemorating notable contributors to the original centre have been restored and will be reinstated. WCA underlined the desirability of having storage space for community groups to store gazebos, banners, filing cabinets, display boards and similar items. and similar items.

Dick Davies thanked council for their proactive role of informing the community about the recent planning zone proposals from the Department of Planning and Community Development and for the high quality submission that council produced in very limited time. There had been no further communication from the ther communication from the

department.

"The planning proposal for a United Petrol Station on Yarra Street is on hold as the applicant has 'stopped the

clock' and a VicRoads report is awaited," Mr Davies said. Mothers are concerned about children crossing War-randyte roads at the Webb Street bus stop and at Taroo-na Avenue. Whilst an option for a second

whilst an option for a per destrian refuge has been budgeted at the Taroona Avenue intersection, council has measured the pedes-trian flow at Webb Street and claims the volume is not high claims the volume is not high enough at present to justify traffic lights, especially as the other crossing is nearby. However, the count can be repeated after the Community Centre reopens when volume is expected to increase. Alternatively a speed limit reduction to 40kph could be requested.

Melbourne Water held an onsite meeting at the Old

onsite meeting at the Old Dairy site on the riverbank. These buildings are derelict but are of heritage interest. The preferred option is to safely remove the bulk of

structures but retain some heritage features. Council preference is that the land be transferred from Melbourne Water to council at no cost. A deadline has been set for the end of No-vember for the completion of community consultation and plans.

and plans.

Council agreed to review rubbish disposal in the parks. They have already installed larger dog litterbins, which tend to be filled with general rubbish.

"Rubbish is overflowing following the monthly community market," Mr Davies said. WCA suggested more frequent emptying or larger skips is required.

frequent emptying or larger skips is required.
Council policy on the shared path along the riverbank currently allows pedestrians, bicycles, dogs and horses. Council is exploring an alternative horse trail along Gold Memorial Road. This has been delayed by a VCAT challenge.

# VCAT costs concern

The Warrandyte Community Association is concerned that the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal is increasing fees. Committee member WARWICK LEESON submitted the following statement to VCAT on WCA's behalf.

N the strongest possible terms, I oppose the proposed VCAT fee increases.

VCAT has an enviable reputation as a tribunal available to the "man on the street" to deal with issues that affect the individual or the local community.

that affect the individual or the local community.

It was readily accessible as it had a fee structure to discourage the frivolous applicant, but they were not big enough to discourage the opportunity for just decision making for the likes of individuals and voluntary community groups.

Justice should not be decided on who has the biggest pocket.

pocket.

We are a small group of concerned individuals, interested in our small com-munity and not made up of

munity and not made up of rich members or those with financial conflicts-of-interest in our decision-making.

If the Warrandyte Community Association, or any community group, elected to object to a council decision to allow an inappropriate development, the fee proposal of \$1007.40 would, more than likely, be prohibitive.

Certainly the Association's bank balance does not go anywhere near that. (The current membership fee for the association is \$10 per family per annum as cost should not be the determinant for membership, but the costs membership, but the costs

of annual incorporation must

be met.)
A single instance of one inappropriate development VCAT application would under the new proposals, exhaust our funds; the community has no hope of being represented if more than one application scenario occur.

application scenario occur. Like most fair-minded vol-unteer community group unteer community group members, I am concerned with preventing frivolous or vexatious applications, but increasing the fees to such prohibitive levels, as is being proposed, would prevent many valid applications.

I note the Environment Defenders Office statement that, "Then hearing fees of between around \$370 and \$1800 a day could be charged on top of that."

This indicates that, other than rich individual sor cor-

than rich individual sor cor-porations, almost all commu-nity groups would be scared

off before even trying to raise the actual fee.

Is the main reason for these proposed exorbitant fees to get rid of the current VCAT backlog or a means of encouraging development, whether appropriate or inappropriate appropriate or inappropri-

On behalf of the Warran-On behalf of the warrandyte Community Association and similar volunteer-based local community groups, I submit that you ought not to go ahead with applying these fees.

### Nillumbik council's new domestic animal rules

Nillumbik council is calling for input on its draft Domestic Animal Manage-ment Plan. "The Nillumbik commu-

nity provided a lot of feed-back through an online survey," a council spokes-person said. "This quality information

has allowed us to prepare a draft considering residents'

responses.
"The draft aims to promote and facilitate responsible ownership of dogs and cats, address a range of animal welfare issues and highlight the benefits of animal companionship,"

the spokesperson said.

It "addresses animal registration and identification, dog and cat nuisance complaints and issues, attacks and rushing by dogs, managing dangerous, menacing and restricted breed dogs, overpopulation and euthanasia, domestic animal

businesses and provisions for dogs off-leash." Written comments should be submitted by 5pm, Thursday, March 28.

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
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# This man is a martyr to medical manipulation

E'VE had a good life really with our fair share of medi-

Not as many as some, however and it's by watching "24 Hours in Emergency: Saturday Night" on SBS that we have come to appreciate what some people go through. Really painful, life threatening stuff with calm, efficient doctors and professional nursing staff. And patients who are

tors and professional nursing staff. And patients who are patient. Not all of our personal medical experiences, however, have been like that.

Herself tells me that, like most men, I don't do illness very well. Evidently I get grumpy and a bit demanding. Unlike her, of course, who is ever grateful, calm, considerate, forbearing and as close to Saint Florence Nightingale as you can get. But I have a reason to be a little bit demonstrative; my man-illnesses are always more significant!

monstrative; my man-illnesses are always more significant! And it all started when I was but a lad.

Most people, when asked, would say that we are lucky to have modern medicine. I agree but the word they don't place enough emphasis on is "modern". The whizzbang, high tech treatment we experience today is relatively recent. In fact, I only need to go back to my early childhood to discover the difference. I am sure, so Herself will tell me on reading this, that I have already told you of my first operation but not everyone out there is as old as she, so out there is as old as she, so allow me to indulge myself once again.

I was eight and whilst at the local dentist, it was de-cided that I needed a tooth extracted. No sooner had the dentist arrived at this con-clusion than he reached into his drawer, took out a three feet (90cm) long hypodermic syringe and "came straight at me". With two nurses unsucme". With two nurses unsuc-cessfully holding my head still and one swarthy dentist failand kicking feet, the decision was made that I was to "have it out" under anaesthetic.

Now we are not talking about

the Middle Ages but at no stage in the discussion about the op was the word "hos-pital" mentioned. The first I pital" mentioned. The first I knew that it was the operation day was when I heard the front doorbell ring. Only distant relatives and trouble rang the front door bell so I was apprehensive to begin with. My suspicion was proved accurate when mum opened about the dentist and the door to the dentist and his nurse.

When they had hunted me

When they had hunted me down, captured me, laid me down on the kitchen table, plonked a rag-covered sieve over my face and doused it with chloroform did I realise that "hospital operating bed" and "kitchen table" are synonyms. Me out, tooth out, dentist left and job done! Terror and paranoia remained.

The second man-sized operation I had was when, at 42, I had my diseased eye lens replaced. Nowadays it's a quick, simple procedure with micro-surgery and a local anaesthetic. Not mine. Not then. I had the proper, difficult one.

Not then. I had the proper, difficult one. Some of you will find this hard to believe but Herself likes to dine out on the story of my "recovery phase" after the operation. Personally, I don't believe that I am in the Guinness Book of Records for taking the longest lime to for taking the longest time to come out of anaesthesia. Nor do I believe that I groaned piteously and told her to go away—several times. Nor do I believe that I "woosily" fainted when, a few weeks later, to remove some of the stitches in my eye, the surgeon locked my head in that optometrist's chin resting device, rolled up my eyelids and "came at me" with the scalpel. No wonder I find illness difficult! Who else has had to suffer like I have! And what is the reason for this exposition?

And what is the reason for this exposition?
Having had surgery on most of the organs in her body, Herself is down to toes. Ever needing to keep up with my incomparable suffering, she has had a few joints in her second toe cut out and the rest of the bones fused. The until-now flexible toe is held in place, until the fusing is complete, with a large pin that extends in the centre for the length of the toe. "A piece of cake!" I hear you say.

For two weeks after the op, all she had to do was laze around with, apart from the quick trip to the loo, her foot raised higher than her nose. Just imagine my problem. Four times a day I had to stop what I was doing to take her pain killers plus meals from the freezer that she had pre-made well before this slack time. Then after the two weeks when the stitches were painfully (sic) removed, she

weeks when the stitches were painfully (sic) removed, she had just another six weeks of hobbling and discomfort before returning to get the pin removed.

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## Last of the summer orchids Need a Geek?

ITH drought continuing to near the end of February, and blossoms and insects few and far between, it was a time to seek out some

insects few and far between, it was a time to seek out some reliable summer orchids.

The search started close to home, at the FOWSP indigenous nursery where the Austral Ladies Tresses bloomed.

Once brought in as a rescued plant, this orchid with pink and white blooms spiralling up its stem, is self pollinating. It now pops up in the nursery's wet plant bog and in other plant's pots as a welcome surprise.

Re-potting these stray orchids from the other pots has slowly increased the number of plants at the nursery. This is fortunate because the orchid is difficult to cultivate from seed and may succumb to scale and overwatering in the winter. In nature it is found in wetland areas near in the winter. In nature it is found in wetland areas near swamps and used to occur near Mt Lofty. This orchid is becoming less common state-wide and near Melbourne,

due to loss of suitable wet-lands, but still can be found near the Dandenongs. This is also the locality for

another summer reliable, the tongue orchid. These once occurred in Warrandyte State Park but have not been seen for many years. We found one species of tongue orchid on the approach to the Baluk

one species of tongue orchid on the approach to the Baluk Willam reserve. This one was nearly finished but still could be identified as the Large Tongue Orchid. It was the only individual we saw that day.

Soon we spotted leathery, erect leaves with purple undersides poking up through the leaf litter in ones and twos and then the bizarre flower spikes of the Small Tongue-orchid.

orchid.

It had green buds at the tip, fleshy fresh flowers in the middle and old flowers turning into seedpods below. This orchid has leaves all year round

except in severe drought and it also has fleshy roots that act as storage organs. A close look at the large lip of the orchid that is thrown up and back from the stem clearly shows the resemblance to an animal

the resemblance to an animal tongue.

A third orchid is still plentiful in Warrandyte State Park. Imagine, trudging up the hill from Whipstick Gully car park, up the "new chums" track. At the top of the gully the track turns sharply to the left, so take the rough steps where rocky, mined-out slopes appear bare under the slopes appear bare under the Eucalypts. Then someone calls out, "Two, three, four, here in flower and another over there!" and we start our count. By the end of the walk we count between 15 to 20 tall flower spikes of lovely pink orchids. This can only be the Rosy Hyacinth-orchid, one of Victoria's showiest. We've made a bet to see who can guess the number or closest to it. It's a bet without forfeit as we all win in pleasure of the pursuit.

The Rosy Hyacinth-orchid slopes appear bare under the

is leafless with green to red stems and survives as a hemi-parasite. Their roots can be quite long—half a metre or so—and they grow around or against a tree root (Eucal-pyt) and a fungal relationship transfers nutrient from the pyt) and a fungal relationship transfers nutrient from the tree to the orchid. As yet these orchids cannot be successfully cultivated and there is much more to learn about their survival techniques. Flower spikes start in previous seasons and stay as

Flower spikes start in previous seasons and stay as short underground buds until the conditions are right to emerge, looking like red asparagus, and then burst into flower.

A single plant may have multiple flower spikes. As the flower matures, it turns 180 degrees so that the lip ends up at the bottom of the flower (in the more traditional orchid flower look). An insect pollinator, usually a native bee, lands here on the tufts of pink hairs.

pink hairs.

By late February mainly stalks with large seed pods remain. It will soon be time to look for autumn orchids.

# Warrandyte dreaming...

AKADU National Park in the Northern Territory is about as far north from Warrandyte as one can

about as far north from Warrandyte as one can go.

Kakadu showcases the very best of the Top End. Magnificent wetlands like Yellow Waters that teem with birdlife; Ubirr sunsets, the Arnhem Escarpment; beautiful rivers and waterfalls; amazing Aboriginal rock art at Noorlangie as well as other aboriginal cultural experiences and incredible wildlife on show.

Visitors from Warrandyte are brought face-to-face with home when visiting the Bowali Visitor Centre at Jabiru because here is a depiction of Warrandyte created by students from Warrandyte Primary School which is part of a large mural "Caring for Country".

This was the experience of local residents Ray and Val Spargo when recently travelling through the Top End. Intrigued by the link between Kakadu and Warrandyte, they explored a few ideas on their return to Warrandyte. Their friend Terry Bainbridge thought it may have been through an association formed in 1974 following the devastation wrought in the Top End by Cyclone Tracy which led to some aboriginal children being billeted in Warrandyte. Two of Terry's sons teamed up with two of these children and (in Terry's words) they all went "walkabout" having a Boy's Own teamed up with two of these children and (in Terry's words) they all went "walkabout" having a Boy's Own adventure—exploring the mines, climbing the old fire tower and swim-ming in the Yarra River. However on contacting Kakadu

National Park, Terry was told the link was actually a former Warrandyte resident, Georgie Saunders (formerly Georgina Waterman). Georgie was a Georgina Waterman). Georgie was a conservationist and an inspired communicator and educator who worked across the Victorian National Parks Service, the Yarra Valley Metropolitan Parks and later in Kakadu. She was innovative and creative in her interpretation programs and literature for parks throughout the state while supportive and encouraging of those she worked with. Her work could be seen in many park visitor centre displays, in "The Yarra Book" and most visitors to Westerfolds Park would have experienced her delightful work through the "Homeshow Trail".

Georgie's professionalism and love of her work led to a range of outcomes that became benchmarks for programs in urban conservation, interpretation pretains and displayed.

comes that became benchmarks for programs in urban conservation, interpretation materials and displays, and ranger exchange programs around Australia. Her commitment to presenting natural and cultural heritage and to community involvement was an inspiration to those staff and interpreters with whom she worked and trained.

worked and trained.
Georgie loved Warrandyte where she lived with husband Don and young son Edward. One of her earliest projects was working on an access path for visitors with disabilities at Pound Bend. She also involved herself in many local conservation.

Bowali Visitor Centre, located near Jabiru in Kakadu National Park, is an award-winning centre both for its brilliant architecture and innovative displays. With the park being jointly managed by its traditional owners and the Australian Nature Conservation Agency, great sensitivity was deand the Australian Nature Conserva-tion Agency, great sensitivity was de-manded in the consultation process during the project's infancy. Georgie demonstrated both sensitivity to Aboriginal people and their culture and a commitment to finding ways of and a commitment to finding ways of encouraging and empowering them. It was a great testament to Georgie's abilities and people skills that during her time working in Kakadu she was accepted as a "granddaughter" of tribal elder Bill Neidjie of a clan of the Bunitj people, a rare privilege.

In a moving obituary in the Warrandyte Diary of November 1996, Marilyn Moore wrote of Georgie's untimely death from cancer and spoke of the loss felt by her family, friends,

of the loss felt by her family, friends, workmates and the local community. She wrote of Georgie's success as a communicator, her concern for the environment, her love of children and her ability to create imaginative fun often with limited resources and of the many tributes to her life and of the many tributes to her life and

work.
In 1997 Warrandyte Primary School
Grade 2 students together with their
teacher Sue Reynolds were asked to
contribute towards a mural to be
installed at Bowali Visitor Centre to
honour the memory of Georgie and
her work. The mural was planned as
a joint creation and involved liaisher work. The mural was planned as a joint creation and involved liaising over research and design with similar age students from Jabiru Area School as well as Kakadu National Park and local artist Ron Reynolds. The Warrandyte section was created with scaled motifs being sent to Kakadu where they were incorporated into an overall design by artist Anne Franklin. The whole mural, installed along one of the galleries, represents three different parts of Australia, Warrandyte in the south, Uluru in the centre and Kakadu in the north.

The bright and colourful Warrandyte section depicts platypus and fish swimming in the Yarra River while children walk their dogs or relax on towels beside the water. A wide range of animals and birds appear amongst the trees. A spiky echidna, plump wombat, multiple

echidna, plump wombat, multiple possums, fat koala and lone kanga-roo can be seen together with mul-tiple birds, frogs, lizards and snakes. Over this lively scene, flying in the

ky above far hills, is a Red-tailed

Black Cockatoo.
Georgie's son Edward, a student at the school, contributed several animals for inclusion and no doubt at the school, contributed several animals for inclusion and no doubt there are numerous other ex-students who can recall the particular contribution they made to this exciting project. At the time parents and students alike were reported to be thrilled by the resulting mural and it still arouses interest from visitors to Bowali some 15 years later. Warrandyte Primary School should celebrate its participation in the work. Don Saunders recently expressed his pleasure that the mural has been treasured and maintained during its life and remains fresh and exciting. For those of us who knew or worked with Georgie it is pleasing to realise that her memory is not only enshrined in her work and this outstanding mural but that since 1999 Interpretation Australia has celebrated her life by awarding the Georgie Waterman Awards which recognise



THE booming interest in mountain biking around Warrandyte and surrounds continues as about a dozen locals, and more from surrounding towns, recently competed in the Kona Odyssey Mountain Bike Marathon in the Otways.

it would be nice to get the Phil Irving trophy."


