Improved Fire-Finders New Aid To Forest Conservation

New developments in fire detection and suppression techniques coupled with improved mechanical facilities, are among the encouraging signs of progress noted by the Canadian Forestry Association in British Columbia.

One of the most recent contributions to the growing battery of weapons which the B.C. Forest Service is now bringing into play in the battle against fire, for instance, is a new lookout fire-finder.

Product of lengthy research by Superintendent J. G. MacDonald and foreman machinist Max Bennett of the Forest Service Marine Station in Vancouver, the new device is credited with three main advantages over the Alldades and Osborne fire-finders previously used here. Enough of the new finders are available to equip all of the

100 fire protection lookouts in the province.

Advantages of the new finder are described by David Monk, B.C. Forest Service, Victoria, who notes that when taking a bearing on a fire with the new finder it is possible to offset it so as to look around the window frames of the lookout, which otherwise always seem to appear right in the centre of the sights. Besides making things easier for the lookout men, this will mean more accurate bearings.

In addition, the combination peep-sight and crossed wires have been proved to be more efficient than the old combination of open-slit and hair sight. The potential error in readings has been reduced by making the horizontal and vertical angle figures a direct reading proposition instead of a combination vernier and direct reading.

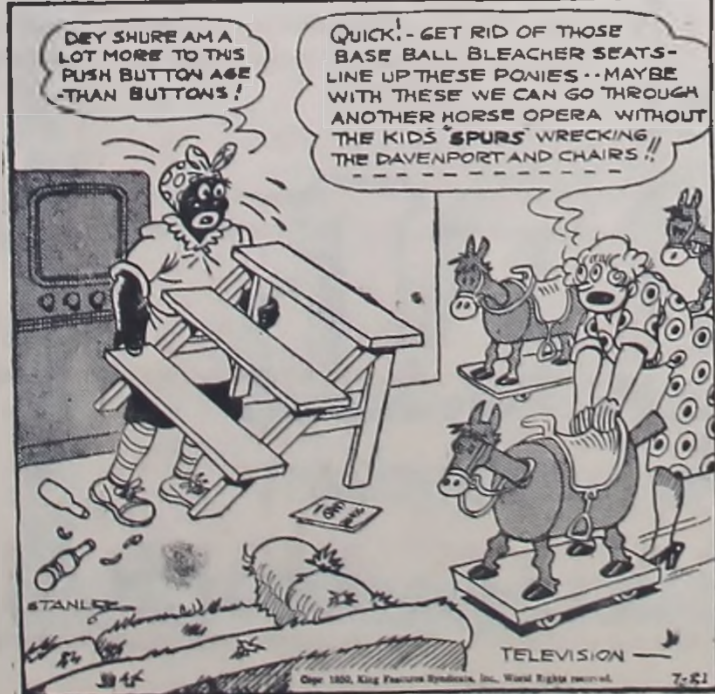

WAR SOUVENIR FOR PRIME MINISTER



Central Press Canadian
An ash tray made from the casing of the first shell fired by the Canadian forces in the Korean war is presented to Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent, at the House of Commons by Vice-Admiral E. R. Mainguy, chief of the naval staff, on behalf of the Royal Canadian navy. The shell from which the ash tray was made was fired August 15, 1950, by HMCS Cayuga, then commanded by Captain Jeffrey Brock of Winnipeg. Three Canadian destroyers, the Cayuga, Sioux and Athabaskan were despatched to the Far East on July 5, 1950, and within a month were serving in Korean waters under United Nations command.

More than one third of Canadian aluminum production, used domestically, finds its way into the construction trade.
